Summary of the Chapter

Job of Mahendra

Mahendra was a junior construction supervisor in a firm. His job was to supervise the work at a construction site. Once the job would be overs, he used to be shifted to another construction site. Thus, the nature of his job was to move from one place to another place.

Iswaran: Amazing Servant and Entertainer

Mahendra's needs were simple as he was a bachelor. He had kept a servant named Iswaran for domestic work. Iswaran followed Mahendra without any complaint. He cooked for Mahendra, washed his clothes and cleaned his shelter. In leisure time, Iswaran read Tamil thriller stories and this affected him so much that even a small incident like a fallen tree appeared to him a bushy beast. Iswaran described everything in detail and weaved a new story full of thrill and horror to Mahendra every day. He played the role of a TV in providing entertainment to Mahendra.

Iswaran Narrates Story of a Tusker

Once, Iswaran told Mahendra a story about his schooldays describing a tusker (wild elephant) and how he behaved when he got mad. The tusker escaped out of a timber yard, destroying everything that came in his way. It entered Iswaran's school. Everyone there was terrified but not Iswaran. He grabbed a cane from a teacher's hand and faced the mad tusker boldly. He hit sharply with the cane onto the third toe of one foot of the elephant and it shivered and collapsed. At this point, Iswaran would leave the story and Mahendra remained in a dangling situation.

Iswaran Narrates Story of a Ghost and Mahendra's Reaction

On another occasion, one auspicious day, he weaved a story about a ghost woman holding a foetus in her hands on a full moon night. Mahendra asked him to stop telling him such nonsense stories as Mahendra did not believe in ghosts and there are no such type of figures.

Mahendra's Encounter with Ghost

After a few days, Mahendra was woken up by some noise near his window sill during the night. First he thought that it was some sort of small animal like a cat, but the noise became louder and louder.

When he peeped through the window, he thought that he saw a cloudy figure clutching a bundle near his window sill. Mahendra could not sleep any more that night. In the morning, Iswaran smilingly asked about the sound and the woman ghost. He also complained about how Mahendra had chided him the other day. Mahendra was so upset that he resigned his site job immediately.

- Ans. Iswaran was a good domestic assistant for Mahendra. Apart from cooking and doing household chores, he was a great entertainer for his master. He was good at managing resources as he could find vegetables out of nowhere. Also, he never complained while accompanying his master.
 - 2 How does Iswaran describe the uprooted tree on the highway? What effect does he want to create in his listeners?
- Or How did Iswaran the storyteller describe the uprooted tree?
- Ans. Iswaran describes the uprooted tree on the highway with eyebrows suitably arched (turned) and hands held out in a dramatic way. He would begin by saying that the road was deserted and he was all alone. Suddenly, he spotted something that looked like an enormous bushy beast lying sprawled across the road. He was half inclined to turn and go back. But, as he came closer he saw that it was a fallen tree, with its dry branches spread out. The effect he wants to create is suspense and a surprise ending to every small incident that he narrates to his listeners specially to his master.
 - 3 How does he narrate the story of the tusker? Does it appear to be plausible?
 - Or How did Iswaran make himself the hero in the elephant story?
- Or How did Iswaran manage to bring down the mad elephant?
- Or How does Iswaran describe the story of the tusker? Does it appear to be plausible?
- Or According to Iswaran how did he tackle the elephant in the school building?

- Ans. He started the story of the elephant by giving a prologue in which he called elephants 'huge well-fed beasts.' He said that after escaping from the timber yard, the elephant started roaming about, stamped on bushes and tore up wild creepers. It then came to the main road of the town and smashed all the stalls selling fruits, mud pots and clothes. It then entered a school ground where the children were playing. It pulled out the football goal-post, tore down the volleyball net, flattened the drum kept for water and uprooted the shrubs. All the teachers and students were so afraid that they climbed up to the terrace of the school building.
 - According to Iswaran, he was studying in the junior class at that time. He grabbed a cane from the hands of one of the teachers and ran into the open. The elephant continued grunting and stamping its feet. It looked frightening. However, he moved slowly towards it. When the elephant was ready to rush towards him, he moved forward and struck its third toe nail. It looked stunned and then collapsed.
 - This story does not appear to be plausible (believable).
 - 4 Why does the author say that Iswaran seemed to more than make up for the absence of a TV in Mahendra's living quarters?
- Ans. The author says so because Iswaran provided a great company to Mahendra. He would chat with Mahendra at night when he returned from his work. Iswaran would also entertain Mahendra by telling stories. Thus, with Iswaran around Mahendra never felt bored and never felt the necessity of having a TV for entertainment.
 - 5 Mahendra calls ghosts or spirits a figment of the imagination. What happens to him on a full moon night?
- Ans. Mahendra calls ghosts or spirits a figment of the imagination because Iswaran informed him that they were living on a burial site and kept narrating him stories of various ghosts he himself had encountered.

On one full moon night, Mahendra was woken up from his sleep by a low moan (crying in pain) close to his window. At first, he thought that it was a cat prowling around for mice. But, the sound was too deep and guttural (husky) for a cat. He resisted looking outside as he did not want to witness a sight that might stop his heartbeat. But, the crying became louder and less subtle. He could not resist the temptation any more. Lowering himself to the level of the windowsill, he looked out at the white sheet of moonlight outside. There, not too far away, was a dark cloudy form clutching (holding) a bundle. He broke into a cold sweat and fell back on the pillow, panting.

- 6 Can you think of some other ending for the story?
- Ans. The story could have ended on a more positive note. Instead of resigning his job, Mahendra could have been shown as a courageous man and proving the ghost theory wrong. Another ending can be of both Mahendra and Iswaran leaving the place together and in turn continuing their bond which is depicted earlier in the story. Iswaran has been explained as a man of all seasons for Mahendra.

- Ans. Yes, Iswaran is a fascinating storyteller. He knows how to build up suspense in his stories. He uses dramatic gestures to make his stories sound realistic.

A good storyteller should have the following qualities:

- (i) He should have good oratorical skills, acting out what he is telling.
- (ii) He should be able to vary the tone of his voice according to the situation.
- (iii) He should be able to create and maintain the interest of the listeners through the use of suspense.
- (iv) He should have a vivid imagination to think up interesting stories.
- (v) He should have a sense of humour which he should use effectively for making his stories enjoyable.

Such was the case with Iswaran who was a man of all seasons for the owner Mahendra. He was so resourceful that wherever Mahendra went, he took Iswaran along with him.

- Iswaran, the cook of Mahendra, had an amazing capacity to produce vegetables and cooking ingredients seemingly out of nowhere. He looked after all of Mahendra's domestic needs satisfactorily, including his evening entertainment. He could cook delicious dishes. He was a good storyteller and his descriptions were influenced by the Tamil thriller novels he read. Even while narrating the smallest of incidents, he would try to make the account thrilling and full of suspense. Mahendra enjoyed listening to him because of the way he told his stories. Thus, Iswaran was really an asset for Mahendra.
- If you had been Mahendra, how would you have reacted when you saw the female ghost?
- Ans. I am a believer in reality. What is obscure (unclear) to me, I would not believe it any way. Reality is important to me over fictions. A figment (illusion) can't make me believe what I can't see in the frames of reality. Above all ghosts are none other than the creations of human mind. It is the impression and outcome of a tired mind and exhausted thoughts. If I had been Mahendra, an educated person who does not believe in ghosts, I would feel that it was a human being out there. I would have gone outside to understand the reality. I could have called out for Iswaran if I felt that some thief was prowling (crawling) around. Next morning also, I would have discussed the matter with Iswaran to find out whether he had any hand in what had happened. I would never have started believing in ghosts because of such an isolated appearance which also was not clarified.
 - 5 How did Iswaran build up his ghost story?
- Ans. Iswaran did not start his stories right away. Instead, he prepared the ground by cooking something special for the 'spirits' of his ancestors. Then, he gave some background information like the site being a graveyard earlier. All this was to build up suspense in the story. He also interrupted (stopped in between) his stories to go about his domestic work which left his listener hanging. When he resumed his story, he gave some more information about ghosts by telling that he had seen a woman ghost carrying a foetus with her. Thus, he built up the suspense and probably 'acted' as the woman ghost to make his story appear true. He was an amazing story teller as well as an actor. He had both the skills to a level next to everything. When he mixed his narratives with the acts then it became the core element of reality though it remained fictitious in nature. He was just a make-up for the TV for Mahendra. Undoubtedly, he was a great storyteller.
